

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

representing each of the College's six academic divisions presented their research on a variety of topics ranging from the effectiveness of technology in the classroom, the uniqueness and validity of fingerprint identification, students' social media use, and insight into the treatment of age-related diseases.

Research projects were coordinated by the Office of Undergraduate Research, which assists students and faculty by awarding College-supported grants, ranging from of \$500 or \$1500, to help in the completion of research projects.

Keystone Lauded for Green Efforts

For the second consecutive year, Keystone College has been named one of the most environmentally responsible institutions of higher learning in the nation by The Princeton Review, a leading national education publication.

Keystone was one of a select group of colleges and universities listed in the Review's second annual edition of "The Princeton Review's Guide to 311 Green Colleges" compiled in partnership with the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC).


The guide profiles higher education institutions that demonstrate notable commitments to sustainability in their academic offerings, campus infrastructure, activities and career prep. The Princeton Review chose the schools for this guide based on a survey of administrators at hundreds of colleges that were polled in 2010 about their school's sustainability initiatives.

Keystone is the only college or university in Northeastern Pennsylvania to be included in the listing and one of only

20 in the state. Other Pennsylvania schools include Bucknell University, Duquesne University, Haverford College, Temple University, Penn State - University Park, and University of Pennsylvania.

"At Keystone, commitment to the environment is not just a buzz word or a trend. It's a long-standing way of life that we value each and every day. We strive to be responsible stewards of our environment and to provide our students with an education that prepares them to become future leaders in the preservation of our natural resources. This is an honor to be shared and valued by the entire Keystone College community," said Keystone College President Dr. Edward G. Boehm, Jr.

Keystone's campus-wide Sustainability Committee uses a comprehensive threeyear strategic plan to guide the College's efforts to assure the campus is green in every area – from curriculum, to stewardship behaviors, to building and grounds. Committee members also seek resources and partnerships that support the

Clothesline Project Raises Awareness About Violence **Against Women**

Dozens of t-shirts hung on lines of rope forming a colorful display across campus this spring as part of the Clothesline Project, a worldwide initiative that raises awareness about violence against women. The shirts were decorated with personal messages from survivors of violence, as well as friends and family members of those affected by violence.

The Clothesline Project was started in 1990 to provide a unique vehicle to educate the public about the scope of violence against women and the impact it has on individuals, their families and friends, and the community. It encourages survivors to come forward to break the silence by sharing their stories.

The colors of the t-shirts represent the type of violence endured: red, pink and orange are for rape or sexual assault; green and blue represent child sexual abuse; grey is for human trafficking; purple signifies rape due to sexual orientation; black for sexual harassment; vellow for domestic violence; and white for homicide.

The Clothesline Project, along with a series of workshops and speakers, is designed to heighten campus awareness of both passive and active forms of abuse, assault, and other violent acts between individuals. This awareness, in turn, helps to promote respect of self and others.


Baseball Team Makes Keystone History

The 2011 Keystone College baseball team accomplished a first in program history by capturing a Regional Championship and advancing to the NCAA Division III World Series in Appleton, Wis. The Giants, who finished the year at 38-12, strung together a 17-game winning streak during the latter part of the season that propelled them to sweeps in their conference tournament, as well as the New York Regional. Junior Esteban Meletiche, the conference Player of the Year, was a key catalyst for the squad. Meletiche, who picked up second team All-American honors, was also named the MVP of the New York Regional and to the All-Tournament Team at the World Series.

Mini Grant Program Supports Keystone Projects

Several innovative projects will take place at Keystone College, thanks to the Alumni Association Mini Grant Program. Mini grants provide financial support for projects that enhance the quality of life at Keystone and the surrounding community.

Among the projects supported are:

- **Keystone CLIMBS** Creating Leadership in Men Breaking Stereotypes. The funds will be used to support a three-part lecture series highlighting successful men in the local community. The series will share examples of leadership, success, and civic responsibility with young men who may be lacking strong male role models.
- Archiving historic Keystone materials The Miller Library is the repository for thousands of photos, documents, and other items that help document the College's evolution. Thanks to a mini grant, the Miller Library will be able to

- adequately organize, store, and preserve many items, helping to preserve Keystone's history.
- Rain Garden Located on campus, the garden will reduce storm water run-off that carries contaminates into the South Branch of the Tunkhannock Creek. The Eco Club project will improve habitat and drinking water for downstream communities. The project will also provide aesthetic value for the campus.
- Reducing Childhood Obesity The mini grant will be used to
 purchase active play equipment
 that will enable the children at the
 Oppenheim Family Children's
 Center to get exercise every day,
 regardless of the weather. The
 Center provides developmentally
 appropriate preschool programming for children from both the
 local and campus communities.



Dr. Fran Langan: A Lifetime Dedicated to Education



Fran Langan, Ed.D., has prepared many Keystone College students for successful careers as educators throughout her 30-year tenure at Keystone. One could safely say that Dr. Langan has dedicated her life to education.

Education was not her first career though. Initially educated as a registered nurse, she worked with a number of programs affiliated with Children and Youth Services of Lackawanna County. She then earned her undergraduate degree from Wilkes University, a master's degree from Marywood University, and a doctorate from Temple University.

When she first arrived at Keystone in 1980, Dr. Langan oversaw the Private Providers Project, which worked with early childhood programs and practitioners. She became an assistant professor in Social and Behavioral Sciences in 1985 and was promoted to full professor and named chair of the Education Division in 1998. She continues in these roles today.

Under her guidance, and that of an expert and seasoned staff, Keystone has become a recognized leader in the education field. The Education division has grown from offering just one associate degree ten years ago, to today offering seven bachelor's degrees, an associate degree in early childhood education and accelerated certificates. The most recent addition was a bachelor's degree in early childhood/special education.

Dr. Langan, along with Professor Lan Shaffmaster, Ph.D., Professor Carol Fontana '73, and faculty colleagues in both

Education and Social and Behavioral Sciences, took the lead in preparing Keystone's application to Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) to offer baccalaureate degrees. This approval process was instrumental in supporting Keystone's transition to a baccalaureate institution in

A veteran educator, Dr. Langan has seen many changes in her field. "Current research on brain development has advanced our knowledge about the ways in which children's learning is best achieved. We continually review our curriculum so Keystone education graduates acquire quality teaching strategies to perform competently in today's classrooms," Dr. Langan said. "To this end, we ensure our students gain valuable hands-on classroom experience throughout their four years. Made possible through collaborative partnerships with local school districts, this field experience is quite impressive and helps students realize that teaching requires

a great deal of commitment."


Dr. Langan's personal commitment to education is evident not only to Keystone education majors but also to young students enrolled at the College's Oppenheim Family Children's Center on the Mellow Family Campus. The nationally accredited school, which provides quality care and education to children ages two to seven years, is directed by Carol Davis. Dr. Langan works with Ms. Davis to maximize the opportunities available to both children and students through grant initiatives.

Dr. Langan is a respected leader at the regional, state, and national level, including having been appointed by former Pennsylvania Gov. Ed Rendell to the Pennsylvania Early Learning Council. The Council provides feedback about state programs designed to serve young children to ensure quality programs and quality educators. Most recently, Dr. Langan has been asked to serve on the state's Building Leaders and Learning Communities Committee to explore the next steps for continuous quality improvements in Pennsylvania.

She has received a number of distinguished honors at Keystone, including the Margaretta Belin Chamberlin Chair Award for Distinguished Faculty Service and the David Gray Award which is annually given to a member of the Keystone community who exemplifies commitment to higher education.

Above all, Dr. Langan is a passionate advocate for all children. Her tireless efforts have resulted in reforms in pre-school curricula, improvements in educational materials, and enhancements in training for early childhood education teachers.

While the education field will undoubtedly continue to evolve, you can be sure that Dr. Langan will be at the forefront of those changes.





Keystone College Graduates: Creating Their Own Pathways to Success

Memories from the Class of '61




